**Dr. Harald Atmanspacher** is a physicist at the ETH Zürich and also active in the fields of philosophy and psychology. He has had a keen and ongoing interest in Giegerich's work for many years.

He has been a faculty member of the C.G. Jung Institute in Küsnacht, Switzerland since 2004 and is an honorary member of theInternational Association for Analytical Psychology (IAAP).

He has also been a faculty member of the Parmenides Foundation since 2005 and currently serves as president of the Society for Mind-Matter Research and is editor-in-chief of their interdisciplinary international journal *Mind & Matter*. He is a fellow of The New Institute's "The Human Condition in the 21st Century."

Dr. Atmanspacher's publications include *The Pauli-Jung Conjecture & Its Impact Today* (with Christopher Fuchs) and his latest book, *Dual-Aspect Monism & the Deep Structure of Meaning* (with Dean Rickles), was published this year by Routledge.

**Dr. Paul Bishop** is the William Jacks Chair of Modern Languages at the University of Glasgow. His books examine the history of ideas, psychoanalysis and analytical psychology with particular emphasis on Nietzsche, C.G. Jung, and Ludwig Klages. His publications include: *Jung's Answer to Job: A Commentary*, the two volume *Analytical Psychology and German Classical Aesthetics: Goethe, Schiller, and Jung,* and *Reading Goethe at Midlife: Ancient Wisdom, German Classicism, and Jung.* 

About the latter publication, Wolfgang Giegerich wrote a review, part of which includes: "At a time when many Jungians are turning to neuroscience to provide an external underpinning for Analytical Psychology, this scholarly book is very welcome: it returns to psychology's home territory, placing Jung firmly in a long cultural tradition.
